I've never been a very good sleeper. As a child I would roam the house at night looking for things to do, people to bug, games to play, snacks to eat... And so, as an adult – having made my peace with the restlessness – I find myself looking forward to the quiet night hours in the evening where I can catch up on cleaning, crafting, and paying the bills. I have a busy mind at night and have found that the rituals of house and home settle me into a place of rest.

It is in this place/ in this time that my prayer life gains its vibrancy. While making lunches to stow away in the fridge for days to come or as I sit at the sewing machine... that is where I can finally name the things that stir in my heart. My hopes become clearer, my anxieties and fears take shape, my plans (sometimes laughable) begin to form, and the people I love and am called to serve come into focus.

My restless evenings in a quiet house – that is where I can finally lay down all the baggage and all the bundles that I had been stewing over.

A while back on Facebook a meme popped up of an old quote (perhaps you have seen it before) saying: "Once a man was asked, 'what did you ever gain by regularly praying to God?' And the man replied, 'Nothing, not a thing... but let me tell you what I lost: anger, ego, greed, depression, insecurity, and fear of death.'" Sometimes the answer to our prayers is not in the gaining but in the losing, which ultimately is *the* gain."

We are asked, again and again, throughout Scripture to bring all things to the ear of our God. "Is anyone among you in trouble? Let them pray. Is anyone happy? Let them sing songs of praise." (James 5:13). To bring to God our words of grief, our thoughts of hope, our concerns, our dreams... all of them are music to our God's ear - sweet and sour note alike. And in the sharing we are transformed. Old wounds find healing. New dreams find traction.

I wonder, children of God, when do you have time (or make time) for transformation? Is it in the car on the way to work? Is it in the morning over your first cup of coffee?

We need rituals of prayer and transformation. And, as a collective, we tend to be pretty bad at it. We uplift the myth of business being next to godliness, we worship the "go go go." And yet, the Scriptures and the history of the Christian movement have modeled for us the need for something more.

If you need help with finding opportunities to pray, here are some ideas:

- ❖ Take a walk through town. Ask yourself along your walk: What happens here? Or how could God use this space. Pray for all the children who come to the park, pray for all the boaters on the water, pray over the restaurants that meaningful conversation and moments would happen at the tables.
- ❖ Touch the doorways. As you pass through a doorway remember to say a prayer for God to open your mind and heart. A quick prayer habit can remind yourself and God that you are listening.
- ❖ Open your address book. This is a time consuming one: sit down every once in a while with you address book and pray your way through the names of loved ones and people long forgotten. Perhaps you could extend this exercise to sending a "thinking of you" card through the mail.
- ❖ Pray before meals or as you wash your hands.
- ❖ Make a journal where you can record you blessings and concerns.

All in all, this month I encourage you to find moments/ to find rhythms of stillness and transformation, times when you can allow God's presence to take root in your heart.

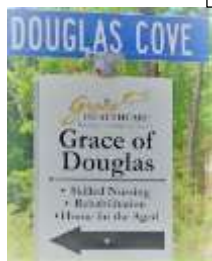

Objective: Kids will choose one sinful habit they want to get rid of.

### **August 12:**

#### ***Cricket***
