

We don't always get it right, but we have fun trying.



"When they had gone, an angle of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream. "Get up!" he said, "Take the child and his mother and escape to Egypt. Stay there until I tell you, for Herod is going to search for the child to kill him." -Matthew 2:13

Each Advent we let Luke and Matthew lead the way on our study of Scripture. Luke, with his tender story of miracles and surprises, pulls at our heart. Matthew, on the other hand, was a devoted and educated Jew and he wrote his Gospel from the lens of his education. He begins with sharing the genealogy of Christ, linking him all the way back to memorable figures like David, Ruth, and Abraham. Matthew is a nostalgic writer with a deep respect for tradition, yet one that doesn't shy away from recalling times of trial and persecution.

Matthew's Christmas story is riddled with anxiety over the unknown. While Luke's is filled with an overwhelming joy and peace, Matthew's is sometimes leery and careful. So, it is no wonder that in Matthew's narrative Joseph, Mary and Jesus find themselves as refugees fleeing in the middle of the night in search for anonymity and safety.

Below I've included a poem by Ann Weems that offers a look inside Joseph's heart as he seeks to provide and protect during this time of unknown. I cherish this poem as one that pushes me to consider the full breadth of the nativity story, perhaps it will do the same for you. For while Christmas, the incarnation of our God, is glorious and so joyful- not everyone is able to recognize this moment for what it is or they don't have the freedom and security to see the joy.

This holiday season, from Thanksgiving to New Years, as you welcome people into your home and as we step out into our community, I encourage you to consider the struggles of the refugees. Consider the struggle of Joseph, Mary and infant Jesus. Consider the struggles of modern refugees - families who find themselves homeless, people fleeing war and violence making their way to borders, spouses trying to find a way out of an abusive marriage... The lost, the lonely, the overwhelmed, the isolate... Let us be mindful of them.

If there is a way to shine forth welcome, then take it! If you have an opportunity to gift God's love, give it! If you see the possibilities of hospitality and warmth, do what you can to share it!

Sometimes people wear their struggles on their sleeve. But more often than not, that insecurity is deeply hidden. May God help us to be mindful and intentional during this most precious time of year. May God help us to be a safe haven for those seeking security.

#### Cookie Tins


This year Women's Fellowship will put together "Tins of Gratitude" for our staff
