From the Pastor's Desk

Whoever brings blessing will be enriched, and one who waters will himself be watered." Proverbs 11: 25

Thanks to some of our diligent "movers and shakers", I've seen signup sheets for Fellowship Hour hosts, Scripture Readers and the Welcome Team being passed around the congregation at our fellowship tables. New year, fresh sign-up sheets! While this makes my pastor's heart happy knowing that we are getting organized and I won't have to scramble to recruit volunteers on the fly... it has made me consider addressing what I like to call "seasons of Sabbath and service."

In a family-sized congregation like ours, many of us find ourselves being passed around various leadership and volunteer roles. Sometimes serving in these roles feels empowering, spirit fulfilling and purposeful. But at other times, we might just feel like we are a warm electable body or just another name to fill an open slot on a sheet.

Service in the church isn't about a good soft happy feeling and it isn't about scarcity or necessity either. Service in God's church is about discipleship. In our faith we are called to bless and nurture, to care for this Earth, and to be of service to our brothers and sisters. That's what we do! Look at the passage above from Proverbs, "we water so that we can grow!" To borrow an image from the Psalmist David: to have a cup turned upwards in faithfulness to God means overflowing! We have to have a place for that blessed overflow:)

We are a people of service. There is a calling on all of our hearts and we are assured through the Scriptures that our giftedness will be used for the kingdom of God.

BUT, there are times when our cup isn't exactly turned upward for God to fill. We get overturned somehow - burn out, hardship, trauma... When we feel like our cup has been upended, that is the time to slow down, sabbath, and re-connect to God and community.

We will all have moments in our lives when we need to step back from leadership roles, volunteerism and involvement to create space and opportunity in our lives to reconnect with our God. There are times when our full focus should be on getting our cup turned upward again so that we can one day overflow with God's love.

- During the week, if Saugatuck Public Schools are closed due to inclement weather, the church office is also closed.

Have You Considered Joining the Board of Ministry?

In a small church like ours, we all chip in with our various gifts to keep the wheels of ministry going! Have you considered stepping into a leadership roll? Leaders within our church, who sit on the Board of Ministry (BOM), are called "Captains". The team is the congregation as a whole (of course), but our Captains make sure we are organized, moving forward and that everyone gets an opportunity to stretch their ministry skills and grow as disciples. There are several open positions on the BOM this year. Perhaps you could consider the roles and pray over what you have to offer your church family in the year ahead as:

Congregational Way Captain

This individual assists with nurturing the congregation's awareness of the Congregational Way. They help with leading membership classes and confirmation classes. Also, they serve as the official delegate of the church in our various fellowship associations: The National Association of Congregational Christian Churches, Michigan Conference of Congregational Christian Churches, and the West Michigan Association of Congregational Christian Churches. This person can help us stay in contact and foster fellowship with our neighboring Congregational churches.

Building Captain

Our beautiful Meeting House has seen lots of changes and additions over it's 160+ years of ministry, and it needs our careful stewardship. Our Building Captain works closely with our Office Manager (Sandra) and the Moderator to make sure repairs and upkeep are seen to. They also help to coordinate our seasonal congregation wide clean up and work days.

Christian Education Captain

Our Christian Education Captain is charged with making sure we all have opportunities to grow in our knowledge of the Bible and can come together in fellowship for spiritual growth. We do not currently have a children and youth Sunday School program, but we do offer adult book studies and Bible studies throughout the year. It is important that our Christian Ed Captain be flexible with the every changing needs of our church body.

Missions & Stewardship Captain

This individual keeps us connected with our annual missions. There are many practical tasks that need doing throughout the year, for example: dropping off canned soup and other food donations to Christian Neighbors, spreading the news about a noisy offering, reviewing and selecting missions to support in the coming year, assisting Pastor Sarah with the Love Fund. This is a role with very specific tasks.

Worship Arts Captain

Music, chancel design, shaping liturgy, coordinating guest speakers... This captain's role is all about creativity, vision and hospitality. This individual works closely with Pastor Sarah to prepare for our Sunday Worship services and cultivate a robust worship atmosphere at the church.

The Board of Ministry meets on the second Monday of the month at 6:30pm. We try hard to keep our monthly meetings to an hour and a half. Together we pray, discuss, and set the direction for the church body as a whole. Consider joining our Board of Captains!

- As of 11/30/2023 we had \$22,160 in our General Fund Checking compared with last year's \$12,924.
- Heritage fund YTD gain/loss, transfers & expenses has our unrestricted balance up \$5,420.
- YTD money market transfers \$25,000, 11/30 Unrestricted Heritage Fund Balance \$79,203.
- November budgeted expenses are \$11,297, Collections-\$7234, Capital Campaign-\$980 (\$41,877 YTD).
- YTD Expenses are \$25,394 under budget, YTD collections are \$11,410 under budget.
- Parking lot donations through November are \$13,076.
